Dear Friends,

A curious thing about the Book of Esther (we'll do our Purim Shabbat on March 6th!!!! and our Purim Shpiel and Carnival on March 8th!!!!) is that it doesn't mention God. Not once. This, of course, places this tale of salvation in stark contrast to most other stories of rescue in our history (i.e., "We were slaves to Pharaoh in Egypt, and the Eternal, our God, took us out from there with a strong hand and with an



outstretched arm. $\overline{''}$ – The Passover Haggadah). There is no such proclamation or perspective in the Book of Esther. In fact, the salvation in the story hinges on two of the major characters, Esther herself and her familial guardian, Mordechai. As you may know, the story takes place in ancient Persia in a city-state called Shushan whose king is Achashveirosh. At the beginning of the tale, the king executes his most favored wife in his haram, Vashti, because she refused to "entertain" royal guests at a feast. The new wife he chooses is Esther, a Jew. Later in the story, the Jews of Shushan are threatened with genocide by a renegade advisor to the king, Haman. Mordechai gets wind of this genocidal plot and sends a message to Esther, telling her that she must convince the king to intervene, which includes revealing her Jewish identity to him. She is frightened and reluctant. Mordechai tries to convince her by saying this, "For if you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance will arise for the Jews from another **place**, and you and your father's house will go lost..." Some commentators exclaim, almost with glee, "Look! God IS in the Book of Esther! There it is, 'another place'. That's a very subtle epithet for God!"

Or not. "Or not" because perhaps "another place" isn't referring to divine intervention at all. Perhaps it's referring to exactly the kind of courage, risk and strength that Mordechai hoped Esther would display (and she ultimately did) coming from somewhere and someone else in the community. Perhaps Mordechai himself. Perhaps some other person or persons. Perhaps the story, looked upon scholastically as a fantasy not locked within the era and geographic location it describes, is about us – in our own time. Perhaps Mordechai speaks to us when he says, "For if you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance will arise...from another place." Perhaps he is telling us that when we vote on March 3 and November 3, we are not voting for a savior. We are not voting to hope that someone else is strong enough to do what needs doing. Mordechai is charging us, saying that the "other place", the other source of freedom and justice, is us. Happy Purim! Have fun...and vote!

Mitzvah of the Month- Matanot l'Evyonim - Sending Presents to the Poor

There are several mitzvot emanating from the Book of Esther and our celebration of Purim. Some of the mitzvot were later instituted in the Talmud and the Book of Esther (9:20-22) itself says:

Mordecai...sent dispatches to all the Jews throughout the provinces of King Ahasuerus near and far, charging them to observe the fourteenth and fifteenth days of Adar every year; the same days on which the Jews enjoyed relief from their foes and the same month which had been transformed for them from one of grief and mourning to one of festive joy. They were to observe them as days of feasting and merrymaking, and as an occasion for sending gifts to one another and matanot la-evyonim, presents to the poor.

I've always found it wonderful that one of the "mitzvah outcomes" of the Purim story is matanot la-evyonim, to give gifts to the poor. The Book of Esther does not focus on the poor at all. Still, a basic way that we decided to celebrate our people's joy is by sharing it with those who are in need...and calling it "gifts". Fabulous. Some commentators, like the Rambam (Rabbi Moshe ben Mamon - a medieval Sephardic Jewish philosopher and physician), (Hilkhot Megillah 2:17), say that the mitzvah of matanot la-evyonim takes priority over the other Purim mitzvot:

It is better for a person to increase his gifts to the poor than to increase the size of his Purim meal or mishlo'ach manot (gifts to one another). For there is no greater and more admirable joy than to gladden the hearts of the destitute, orphans, widows and strangers. One who gladdens the hearts of the unfortunate is likened unto the Divine Presence.

What is the minimum to fulfill this mitzvah? The Talmud (Megilla 7a) concludes that a person should give two "gifts" (because the mitzvah says gifts, in the plural. Rashi (Rabbi Shlomo Yitzchaki, a medieval French rabbi and author of a comprehensive commentary on the Talmud and commentary on the Tanakh, Hebrew Bible) spells it out, two gifts, one each to two individuals. Rashi (Responsa 293, Shibolei Ha-leket 202) further notes that there is no minimum amount for matanot la-evyonim, as it is a form of tzedakah, righteous giving, for which there are no minimums or maximums because it is a matter of bringing justice where it is lacking. Some, however, require a more specific gift, since it's purpose is to address person living in poverty. The Sha'arei Teshuva (An ethical work authored by Yonah Gerondi and first published in 1505), (695:1), referring to a standard of the Zera Ya'akov (was a seventeenth-century Ethiopian philosopher) maintains that a person should give a minimum of "three eggs," i.e., a small meal.

Finally, the Rambam (Hilkhot Megilla 2:16) and Shulchan Arukh (694:3) (the most widely consulted code of Jewish law written in by Joseph Karo in 1563) admonish us not to be exacting with people asking for charity on Purim. All who "extend their hand" are given matanot la-evyonim on Purim. The Ramban (cited by Nimukei Yosef, Bava Metzia 48b), as well as the Tur (it's full name being the Arba'ah Turim, an important legal code composed by Jacob ben Asher 12-14th c.), (694) and Shulchan Arukh (694:3), write that one may give matanot la-evyonim to Jews and non-Jews alike, in order to avoid "eiva" (enmity or animosity).

So, are you informed and ready to give gifts to the poor, matanot la-evyonim, on Purim and beyond?! Do it because you can. Do it because it needs doing. Thanks for praying with your legs.

Running into people I know (or almost know) is one of my favorite things. That kind of impromptu encounter, whether it's a wave or a conversation, elevates the activity from errand or event into community. Being recognized at the doctor's office as the Beth Shir Shalom Lobby Lady, or coming home from the grocery store with milk AND an update on an old friend's life is a dividend of living in the same place a long time, but that feeling doesn't have to be left entirely to chance.

Community – congregation – is built of encounters both intentional and accidental. We show up at Beth Shir Shalom <u>on purpose</u> … for pre-school drop off, for JELLI pick-up, for Shabbat services, for holiday celebrations, life cycle events or to support fundraisers, maybe even to drop off paper work or volunteer. But once we put ourselves in that welcoming space, we are open to surprises! We see friends we didn't know would be there, and people there we didn't know would be friends. After all, everyone else there has at least one thing in common with us... but how many more? Maybe the other volunteer is from our hometown; the people at the next table saw the same movie last night; someone in the lobby has a kid at the same school as ours. Music, food, books, teams... if we ask and listen and talk and share, how many more things do we have in common with the other folks who show up at Beth Shir Shalom?

We can find these points of connection and build on them, if we are there without hurry or distraction. If we can present ourselves a little early, if we can stay present, and if we can let ourselves linger a little later, we have even more chances to give and receive the gift of connection. Helping to set up for an event; eating cookies during Oneg; having time after something to get coffee or take the kids to the park -- these may not be the moments we showed up for, but they may be the moments that become our favorites, the moments that make us feel we're in a community of people we know and who know us.


